Timeline – VI Book 2

Short Half

- Academic rhythms and routines change
- Step up to A level work. (bridged by end of Vbk. programme)
- Begin Extended Project Qualification (EPQ)
- Higher Education: Begin to consider university applications (UK); attend US prep classes and do college research
- New opportunities (e.g. entrepreneurship)

Common Time

- Higher Education launch; UCAS, BridgeU, Firefly
- University reading and research; SAT/ACT/subject tests
- EPQ draft deadline (end of term)
- Holiday work; university visits

Cloister Time

- Mock exams, anticipated grades
- University: UCAS materials in draft; US applications and teacher recommendations
- University: Preparation sessions
- EPQ: final hand in and presentations
- Holiday work & personal statement

Timeline – VI Book 1

Common Time

Short Half

- Predicted grades finalised
- Final deadlines (early)
- Admissions Tests (check)
- Interviews (not just Oxbridge)
- Some UK and US offers (early deadline)

• January mocks

- University offers and selection of firm/insurance offers
- Coursework. deadlines
- Easter revision

Cloister Time and beyond

- Exams
- Preparation for university courses
- July: Domum and Leavers' events
- August: Results day (all)

Courses and combinations

- Think carefully about university options and logical combinations
- Maths to underpin sciences and Econ
- FM: most competitive courses for Engineering, CompSci, NatSci, Econ
- Medicine Chemistry, Maths (Bio, Physics)
- Humanities: seek complementarity MFL, English, History


- Why study in the US?


