Tuesday 29th November: Football: JCA v Harrow, ISFA Trophy (a)

On Tuesday, the JCAs faced Harrow for the first time in the first round of the ISFA Shield. After a tense start, Harrow scored first from a poor pass back by usually reliable defender Arthur J-D (D) who misjudged the slower pace of the sandy pitch.
