

Sports Report - Common Time 2023: Week 9

The penultimate week of term saw a large amount of sports fixtures taking place so read on to catch up on the various achievements, performances and results.

House Chess (Baxter Pot)

In response to the growing popularity of chess, the size of house teams for Baxter Pot this year was increased from 4 to 5. All houses fielded impressive teams, so that no match was won to nil. There were several 3-2 wins and the Quarter-final between Phil's and College 2 went to board count as a tie-break after finishing 2.5 each, with Phil's edging into the semi-finals. Despite the closeness of the matches, all of the seeded teams won their quarter-finals. Hopper's and Beloe's showed a lot of promise in their young squads, while College has impressive strength in depth after a few lean years. Tuesday 14th March Badminton v Harrow (h)

Tuesday 14th March Rugby 7s
