

Sports Report: Cloister Time, Week 6

Tuesday 7th June: Cricket: Development XI vs Rifles (h)

A young and enthusiastic Development XI took on The Rifles on Lord's. Batting first after winning the toss opening pair of captain Fletcher Rhodes and Amaar Malik played watchfully at first before accelerating to compile a century opening stand - Amaar making 39 and Fletcher a well-crafted 85. James Kennedy scored 21 and showed glimpses of his outstanding form for the Yearlings before Jack Bristowe gave the innings some real impetus and urgency in scoring an impressive 50 not out, off just 53 balls. The captain declared on 225-5 from 51 overs.

The Rifles made steady progress towards their target and when the 6th wicket fell at 164 with 11 overs remaining in the day's play we appeared to be in the 'box seat' but the momentum shifted as The Rifles struck a couple of big sixes and eventually got home to win by 3 wickets in the penultimate over. However, all our bowlers acquitted themselves well – Sam Humphreys was the stand out and deserved better than his figures of 2-56 suggest. There were wickets too for Stanley Askew, Aneesh Kulkarni and Fletcher Rhodes.

Overall an excellent game of cricket with all four results possible virtually throughout which was a measure of Fletcher's well-timed declaration and the way in which both sides approached the game. Ultimately though The Rifles proved to have a shade more firepower in their artillery. (MCE)

U17 XI vs Marlborough College, The Cricket Paper National U17 Cup (a)

We won the toss and elected to bat, which looked a really good decision when we were 104-0 off 18 overs. Wilf had scored 56 off 45, but was then stumped playing a switch hit! We still progressed well with Zain hitting 52 and at 146-2 with 10 overs left were well placed to post a very good score off our 35 overs. However, a mid-innings wobble saw us collapse to 155-7! Alex Claisse contributed a useful 14 off 13 balls, but it was left to Will Matthews and Callum Whillock, who both batted very sensibly and with clear minds to put on 25 off the last few overs which ensured we set Marlborough 200 to win.

We did not start well in the field, conceding 16 off the first over and 25 off the first 13 balls! However, a good catch by Wilf at extra cover accounted for Marlborough's best player, followed by another wicket and some parity was restored! Marlborough's 3rd wicket pair put on a run a ball 50 partnership ensuring they were never needing much more than 6 an over, but a direct hit by Pat Ritchie was a key moment and broke the partnership. We then managed to create some pressure and the scoring rate required increased but we were also very grateful when Marlborough had a mix up, which resulted in another run out and their number 3 who had batted well was out for 47. We then took regular wickets and the run rate climbed further, eventually bowling Marlborough out for 152 and a win by 47 runs.

Alex Claisse will bowl much better and take fewer wickets, however he finished with 5-43, Will Whitehead bowled well and economically conceding less than 4 an over and Dom Hall finished with 1-33. We certainly did not play at our best, but we managed to find a way at key moments in the game and we progress through to the last 8 of the National Competition. (PNG)



Thursday 7th June Cricket v Eton College

This was a really good game for the **Development XI** which we lost by 4 wickets with 10 balls to spare. We won the toss and made a good score of 236-4 from our 45 overs. We lost Henry Nichols early on but Zain and Fletcher put on a good partnership of 63, with some excellent stroke play on both sides of the wicket. Fletcher was then bowled by a ball that moved back into him, but Zain and Seb then put on another 54 and we well set for a decent score. Seb Morgan then accelerated brilliantly with shots all around the ground including 4 big sixes and thoroughly deserved his 100! He was well supported by George Gardiner (32*).

Athletics: Hampshire Schools Athletics Association Championships, Mountbatten Centre, Portsmouth

This was an excellent set of performances from the five boys competing at the Hampshire Schools Athletics Championships. Hamish Rogers (VI1,D) jumped 1.71m to take the Senior Boys high jump title and in the Intermediate Boys (U17) competition Gus Bowden (V,F) took 1st place with a jump of 1.70m. Gus then took 2nd place in the Intermediate 100mH with a pb of 16.0s. JP pupil Rory McGregor (H) took 1st place in the Junior Boys Long jump with a new pb of 5.33m. Harry Draper-Barr (VI2, I) secured the senior discus title with a pb of 39.16m and Tim Kashirin (VI1, E) finished runner-up in the Senior Boys 200m. Gus and Rory gain selection to represent Hampshire at the South & South East Inter-Counties championships next weekend. (MSB)

Cricket v St Edward's School, Oxford

Having been invited to bat first on a grassy wicket, la Fontaine Jackson and Nicholls set about run scoring cautiously for **Lords**. The slow medium pace of the first change bowler proved particularly tricky to get away, which eventually lead to Nicholls being run out as we sought to put more pressure onto the bowler and fielding side. Malik helped LFJ accelerate a little as they scored 52 in the next 10 overs before Malik dragged on. We reached 120-2 from 30 overs at lunch and were keen to kick on in the last 20 overs. Some tighter bowling made this difficult, LFJ also dragging on after passing 50 and Batten caught making us 156-4 in the 41st. Morgan and Ritchie both looked positive in their approach, willing to hit over the top, before both also departed, leaving us 175-6 from 44. A boundary-free 40 run partnership from the last 6 overs from Hall and Gardiner helped us to 215-6 at the close of our innings, which we felt was competitive on a slow and challenging surface.

Our reply with the ball did not begin well. Wides on both sides of the wicket, plus some gratefully accepted 'freebies' allowed the Teddies opening pair to keep the score ticking, before they put their foot down as Hall and Fisher entered the attack. With Teddies 98-0 in the 18th over, and the coaches fearing the worst, the introduction of Whillock brought some control and the crucial breakthrough we needed. Skipper Fisher then saw an opportunity to bring back Morgan in a master stroke before tea. Whillock had removed the Teddies Skipper before Morgan, bowling to the England U19 keeper, followed up a dispatched bouncer with a perfect delivery that took a fine outside edge through to Gardiner. He then removed the other opener thanks to a good catch from LFJ above his head at first slip before Whillock added his third before Tea, through a very sharp catch from Gardiner off a bottom edge.



With us having fought our way back into the game, but the scoring rate not likely to be an issue for our hosts, Hall returned from the other end and kept things tight in a 4 over spell after Tea, whilst Whillock continued his good form to complete his 5-wicket haul, thanks to catches by Malik and Batten. Claisse replaced Hall and Fisher took over from Whillock. The former missed a tough return catch but was relieved to see another chance taken by Nicholls only a few balls later. Morgan contributed to a run out for the 9th wicket with a smart throw into Gardiner before Fisher claimed the last with another good catch for Gardiner to wrap up a 42 run victory that had looked most unlikely for much of our time in the field. 2nd XI won by 10 runs

The **3rd XI** arrived at St Edward's, won the toss and elected to bat. Openers Fennell (I) and Fisher (B) strode out to bat after usual opener Captain Kleingeld (G) went missing at the start of play. The St Edwards openers bowled well combining bouncers and full balls from both ends to restrict the 3rds to 36/2 after 10. The 3rds were struggling at 43/3 after 12 but a partnership worth 57 between Brooke (22) and Harker (46), and then some lower order fireworks from Simpson (G) and Osborne-Young (H) brought the 3rds to 142-8 from 25 overs.

St Edward's cruised with relative ease - 39/0 after 8 - before the injured Burge (F) sparked a wicket and bowling became tighter from the former, Brooke (A), and McCreery (A). After 15 overs St Edward's began to accelerate after sloppy displays of fielding allowed them to reach 116/3 from 21 with Osborne-Young (H) taking a wicket. East (C) charged in to bowl the last over with the opposition requiring 4 from 6 and then 2 from 2 before the ball was cracked for 4. A tough, close loss for the 3rds. (Gus Brooke, A)

The **JCAs** were never quite in control of the game but fought hard, showing resilience to dig themselves out of tough situations. A first ball drop is never a great start, especially when their openers rack up an 89 partnership over 18 overs, giving themselves a great platform from which to get to 174-4 off their 30. An impressive total on the large and relatively slow pitch. Bowder was the pick of the bowlers, keeping them to only 25 off his 6 as they were trying to expand. Husband and Humphreys got the wickets.

A first ball wicket is never a great start, especially when we fall to 12-2. Bristowe was going nicely, playing particularly well off his legs, but we lost regular wickets around him - small partnerships where Jack was ably supported by Kheterpal and Cloke Brown were the highlights. Needing 8 an over for the last 12, Jack and Anthony started to expand, before Jack was dismissed on 45. A flurry of wickets made it seem we weren't going to get near their total, but Henry and Anthony batted excellently for the 10th wicket, putting us within touching distance at the expense of Henry's bat and leg! Ultimately, we fell 20 runs short. (BMG)

The old age "catches win matches" came true as the **JCB** beat St. Edward's fairly comfortably in the end. Winning the toss and bowling first Winchester had to work hard to break a solid opening partnership but when Jonas Bhattacharya took the first of his 4 wickets for 11 runs in 5 overs the door was opened. The bowling unit took regular wickets, with 3 catches held and a Run Out to finish the innings. Jonas' two wicket maidens were noticeable as the first maidens bowled this season. The opposition's total of 110 was definitely "gettable" but would have been less if we had not bowled 17 wides in total.



With partnerships of 27, 28 and 41 the U15B team did indeed make comfortable progress towards 111 with contributions from all and a little help from 4 dropped catches. Jonny Inglis deserves mention for his 17 up front as he stepped in, along with Stefan Ungureanu, to help a team weakened by CCF absences. The decisive contribution came from Milo Hoffmann, who continued his good form with the bat, scoring an unbeaten 35. (JM)
