Basketball v Marlborough College (a)

In the second round of the ESFA Cup we travelled to Brookfield School to play on their 3G surface which allowed good confidence for players in possession and we settled into our game quickly. Our hosts were very competitive and Santagati in particular received a few strong challenges, one leading to a free kick in a central position from 40 yards. Sullivan stepped forward and stroked his pass over the defensive line to bounce before the keeper, who amidst a rush of Winchester players looking to attack it missed it entirely and Sullivan's effort bounced into the open net.



We retained the lead until half time but then conceded early after the break, via a left footed shot from the top of the box into the far bottom corner. Browning had made some excellent saves before this but was to be undone again by a fantastic free kick into the top right corner of the goal to give Brookfield the lead. We responded well and Oluwabusola showed good footwork and presence of mind to toe-poke an effort from close range. Both sides pushed for a winner but neither found one, taking the game to 10 minutes each way of extra time.

Brookfield continued to battle hard and put together another good passing move that allowed a midfielder to receive on the half-turn and then thread a pass through to the forward. He showed good presence of mind to allow the ball to role across him and past Browning (who did well not to bring him down and risk being sent off) before gathering the ball and placing a shot beyond the defenders on the line. A lot of excitement ensued from the home supporters.

Needing a goal, or more, we discussed passing with more conviction and exploiting the speed of Laarman and Oluwabusola up-front. The players responded immediately as our kick off was set back to Santagati who played his lofted pass well enough to evade both centre backs and Oluwabusola breaking in behind them, who calmly took the ball around the goal keeper and scored in the open net. Buoyed by the early goal we kept looking to play on the front foot and created further chances whilst Browning made yet more good saves at the back. SC B v Bradfield U16C: D0-0

The **Sen Colt Cs** recorded their first victory of the season on a windswept pitch away against Bradfield's U16D team thanks to a scorching goal off the boot of Haddad. Although the scoreline only shows one goal, this was a dominant performance, with a vivacious attack, energetic pressing from midfield – in particular Zhong - and some authoritative defending from Tait, Perks, Bhagobati and Oliver, with Shi and Humphreys bringing energy in the CDM role as well. In fact, the only Bradfield opportunity came from Bhagobati's rolling back-pass, which left keeper Ohiwerei temporarily caught out, and the coach's Garmin showing a distinct spike in heart rate, before a scrambling clearance.

Winchester dominated possession throughout, with Hayward playing a strong pass and move game to open up the right-hand side of the pitch, and at half time the corner count was already well into the double digits with Bradfield's keeper being kept in gainful employment.
