Rackets U14 v Marlborough College (a):

Sam (A), Casper (E) Pierre-Alexis (G), Caspar (F), Thomas (E) and Theo (E) all took part in a friendly fixture designed to provide valuable experience on away courts. The games followed a round-robin format where each participant combined with a different partner for each match. Everyone had impressive moments, and notably, when our A pair did team up together, they managed to secure a solid win against their counterparts.

Thursday 1st February 2024 Badminton v Charterhouse (a): Won 12-0

Away in the county of Surrey, we brought our top two pairs to the first annual Charterhouse Cup. The tournament consisted of seven schools, and we came across some unfamiliar faces. With a quick win in the first game against Epsom College, our first pair, consisting of JohnPaul (E) and Ayson (C), did not expect the high-quality badminton brought by Charterhouse in the next game. Having been a year-long hiatus since we last played them, we were shocked by the attacking strategy they brought. Falling behind after the eleven-point switchover, the first pair decided to be hyper-aggressive. Thankfully, the risk was rewarded, and we won narrowly by a scoreline of 21-19.



The first pair then brought their A-game and decisively defeated Christ's Hospital, who were looking sharp during warmup, with a score of 21-13. Soon after defeating Reed's School convincingly 21-3, the first pair faced Wellington College, a formidable rival. With the match being level at 13-13, we stepped off our back foot and managed to crack through their defence, winning a string of points and eventually winning with a 21-14 score. In the final match, we faced an unseen opponent: Tiffin School. Their top pair consisted of an elite county player and a powerful partner with a strong smash. Initially, our top pair was overwhelmed by their combination of power and skill. Trailing behind, we managed to find our rhythm and went on the offence. Receiving at 20-19, JohnPaul and Ayson

Soccer XI v Epsom College, ISFA Trophy Quarter-Final (h):

After a great football term last year we went into the game on a high, but after limited time on the grass we struggled to get going in this game.

We have to give Epsom credit as they looked extremely motivated for the game, bringing an energy and intensity which we were disappointingly unable to match. Perhaps there were other things on some players' minds? Ultimately, Epsom were able to finish the chances they created due to their greater clinical edge, whereas the few chances we created saw us unable to beat their keeper who had a great game. We went behind in the 43rd minute conceding a free kick on the edge of the area, having given away probably 4 or 5 other fouls in the preceding five minutes. It wasn't particularly smart football, and we were punished when the Epsom striker struck a great free kick over the wall and into the top corner. The goal was probably a fair reflection of the first half where we were grateful to Anthony for some important saves he made for us.

Rowing Fixtures at home & Southampton

WCBC took 2 8+'s to Southampton on Saturday, a J15 8+ and a J16 8+, along with a top year filling a seat in an 8+ in an opposing crew. Our boats were already rigged and ready to go once the boys did their final checks at their designated seats.

There was a good atmosphere at Southampton Boat Club as most of the crews racing were all boating from the same place. The time trials started at 15:00, after a very brief warm – up and once all the safety launches were in position, the first boat was sent off; this was Southampton men, followed by Itchen, then our J16's, 2 women's 8+'s and finally our J15's. They raced over 2.8k and once they reached the finish, all 6 boats spun around to paddle back to the start to race the course again.

Once both time trials had been raced our J16's came 3rd in both races, with two very good times down the course. The J15's came 4th in the first time trial and 5th in the second. Both crews preformed very well!

While the boys were in Southampton the girls were having a fixture of their own, on their home stretch of water. The event revolved around mixing different crews up and giving an opportunity to head race (time trial) so there were no overall results, but it was a very successful afternoon of rowing.
