What a great game of cricket played on the Ageas main ground as **Lords** hosted Canford at the home of Hampshire CCC. A fantastic experience for both the lads and parents, the only slightly disappointing part was that there were not more people there to watch and enjoy.



We won the toss, but were reduced to 37-3 against some good, tight bowling. Henry edged to the wicket keeper, Zain to first slip and Wilf was caught at deep mid-wicket. Chris and Fletcher had to then rebuild which understandably was a little slow at first, but we managed not to lose further wickets and were 87-3 off 30 at lunch giving us a platform to push on. This we did; Fletcher and Chris played very well as a partnership. Chris looking to rotate the strike and Fletch looking for boundary options and their stand of 148 was superb in the circumstances. Pat Ritchie followed up with a more than useful 24* off 12 balls, timing the ball very well and we posted 231-7 from our 50 overs, which was a great effort especially from lunch.

However, we knew we needed to bowl well and taking two early wickets was just what was required, but the Canford Number 4 ensured that they were always up with the run rate being particularly ruthless on anything bowled wide of the off stump. Paddy turned to himself and Callum and this steadied the ship taking valuable wickets and both bowling through their 10 overs, Paddy 1-33 and Callum 3-33. At tea Canford were 112-6 from 30 overs, but with their key batsman still in. Unfortunately, what should have been a 20 minute break became an hour due to rain, but the Ageas ground staff were superb in both covering and then removing the covers as soon as possible so that we did not lose any overs.

We did not bowl as well as we needed to and Canford kept up with the rate. Despite losing a couple of wickets they still required 23 from the final 3 overs with 2 wickets in hand. Ed Jack, part of the Hampshire Academy and Canford's best batter had played a great innings and hit 15 in the third from last over although he was slightly fortunate in that the 3rd ball went to long-on where Wilf took the catch but could not avoid stepping over the rope! Canford required 7 from 2 overs and then 6 from the last 7 balls but after Fletch had bowled a great first 5 balls the last ball went for 4 unfortunately leaving Canford requiring 2 from the last over and then 1 from 5 balls.
